Last month, we continued our congregational conversation about healing the past and moving toward the future. Our format was a little different as I split folks up into groups for easier conversation. Essentially, I asked the groups to restart First Christian Church from scratch -- its purpose, vision, fundamental beliefs, and how one becomes a part of the church. There was fantastic dialogue and exploration of what is most significant in the life and ministry of First Christian Church, Shelbyville. However, there is little consensus to guide our way forward -- but that's not necessarily a bad thing.

When we talk about the purpose of First Christian Church, we developed a number of answers -- which means there are a lot of ways to connect to the life and ministry of our church. But, it also means that we can spread our attention and energy thin over a wide number of things. In that, we will feel unsupported by our church; we will lose energy and hope in making a difference; we will become burned out and simply fall away from participation in the life of the church. We need to be about strengthening our core.

For those of you who have ever gone to a physical therapist for shoulder, knee, hip, or back pain, you know that the first thing you will do is exercises designed to strengthen your body's core -- abdominals, glutes, and back muscles. When your core is healthy, you can begin to work on making the other areas of your body healthy again. The same concept is true for the church -- the body of Christ. From a strong and healthy core, the other areas of pain or illness can become strong and healthy again too.

To keep the conversation going, on Sunday, December 11, we will talk again -- this time over breakfast. The men will fix our breakfast and have it ready to serve at 7:45 a m

After most folks have finished eating, we will focus our conversation once again on the core purpose of the church. Everyone is invited to breakfast and for fellowship and conversation.

Last Sunday, the Season of Advent began. Advent is the season we prepare our hearts, minds, and lives for God to breakthrough and into this world. Our Sunday worship centers around hope, peace, joy, and love in Advent. Through this time of uncertainty and challenge, we can explore what each of these weekly themes says to us and how we move forward.


CANTATA


